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QUICK HITS

- Washington holds eight selections in the 2021 NFL Draft which opens on Thursday, April 29. The first round begins at 8:00 p.m. ET and will be televised by NFL Network, ABC and ESPN. The draft will continue at 7 p.m. ET on Friday with the second and third rounds, and will conclude with rounds 4-7 on Saturday, starting at noon ET.
- Washington will host media virtually during all three days. Head Coach Ron Rivera and General Manager Martin Mayhew will speak to members of the media at the end of proceedings on Thursday, Friday and Saturday.
- Washington made eight selections in the 2020 NFL Draft. All of the selections appeared in game action last season including first-round selection Chase Young, who started in all 15 games he appeared in and won AP Defensive Rookie of the Year.
- Washington produced two Pro Bowlers in 2020, including guard Brandon Scherff and rookie defensive end Chase Young. Scherff was a first-round pick of Washington in 2015 (No. 5 overall) and Young was a first-round selection in 2020 (No. 2 overall).
- In the last eight seasons, Washington has had nine players earn a total of 20 Pro Bowl selections, eight of which were by homegrown talents. Eight of the nine Washington Pro Bowler's since 2013 (Williams, 7; Kerrigan, 4, Scherff, 4; Alfred Morris, 2; Kirk Cousins, 1; Brian Orakpo, 1; Jordan Reed, 1; Chase Young, 1) entered the NFL as Washington draft picks.
- Barring a trade, Washington's first selection in the 2021 NFL Draft is the No. 19 overall selection. Through the draft and free agency, Washington has compiled six first-round selections through the draft and free agency. Five of them were selected by Washington and one was added via free agency. The table below outlines the six first round selections currently on the Washington roster.

2021 SELECTIONS

- Washington enters the 2021 NFL Draft with a total of eight scheduled selections. Washington finished the season at 7-9 and won the NFC East Division.
- Washington holds five of their original selections including picks in the first, second, third, fourth, fifth and seventh rounds. They also hold two picks in the third and seventh rounds, respectively.
- Washington traded T Trent Williams to the San Fransisco 49ers during the 2020 NFL draft in exchange for a 2020 fifth-round pick in which the team selected C Keith Ismael and a 2021 third round selection.
- Washington traded their original sixth round selection to the Las Vegas Raiders for T David Sharpe and an additional seventh round pick. They then traded that selection for G Ereck Flowers and received the No. 258th pick from the Dolphins.
- Thursday's first round will allow 10 minutes before each pick. The
 second round, which resumes the draft on Friday evening, allows
 seven minutes between picks. The third round allows five minutes
 between selections. The final four rounds will take place on Saturday.
 Rounds four through six allow five minutes between picks, and all
 seventh round and compensatory picks allow four minutes each. The
 2020 draft will mark the fourth year in which teams will be able to
 trade compensatory selections.

INTERESTING TO NOTE

- Dating back to 2011, Washington has selected at least eight players in 10 consecutive drafts for the first time since the league adopted the seven-round format in 1994.
- Washington currently has two third-round selections. It is the first time the organization is scheduled to have two third round selections since 2014.
- The 2020 NFL Draft was the second-consecutive draft that Washington picked four offensive players in a row (2020: RB Antonio Gibson, T Saahdiq Charles, WR Antonio Gandy-Golden and C Keith Ismael; 2019: WR Terry McLaurin, RB Bryce Love, G Wes Martin and C Ross Pierschbacher). Prior to that, the last time Washington selected four consecutive offensive players in the same draft was 2008 (WR Devin Thomas, TE Fred Davis, WR Malcolm Kelly and T Chad Rinehart).
- In 2020, Washington drafted players from Ohio State with their first pick in consecutive seasons marking the third time in franchise history that the team has drafted players out of the same school with their first pick in back-to-back draft. The other two instances were DT Daron Payne (2018 Alabama) and DT Jonathan Allen (2017 Alabama), FB Leon Heath (1951 Oklahoma) and HB George Thomas (1950 Oklahoma).
- Washington selected four defensive players in the 2020 NFL Draft. They have picked at least four defensive players in six consecutive drafts for the first time since 1989-93, when the draft consisted of 12 rounds.
- Five of the 10 members of the Washington's 2020 draft class played at schools in "Power Five" conferences.

- Young was the 485th selection made by Washington in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 32nd first-round selection in that time frame. He was the 63rd first-round selection by Washington all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.
- Young's selection marked the fourth-straight year in which Washington selected a defensive player with a first-round pick in the draft joining Montez Sweat (No. 26 overall in 2019), Daron Payne (No. 13 overall in 2018) and Jonathan Allen (No. 17 overall in 2017). It was the first time in team history Washington has selected defensive players with a first-round pick selection in four consecutive drafts.
- Young was the 11th defensive player selected by Washington in the first round since 1999, joining CB Champ Bailey (1999), LB LaVar Arrington (2000), S Sean Taylor (2004), CB Carlos Rogers (2005), S LaRon Landry (2007), DE/LB Brian Orakpo (2009), LB Ryan Kerrigan (2011), DT Jonathan Allen (2017), DT Daron Payne (2018) and DE Montez Sweat (2019). Seven of the 10 defensive players selected by Washington in the first round in that time frame have earned at least one Pro Bowl selection during their career.
- Young was the 19th player Washington selected out of Ohio State. Ohio State has now produced the sixth-most draft selections in franchise history, trailing only Notre Dame (34), USC (30), Alabama (26), Penn State (22) and Nebraska (20).
- In 2019, Young ranked No. 1 in the nation in tackles for loss per game (1.91), No. 1 in sacks (16.5) and sacks per game (1.50), No. 2 in forced fumbles (six) and No. 4 in total tackles for loss (21.0).
- Young joined Mike Vrabel as the only player in Ohio State history to post consecutive seasons with 10-plus sacks.
- Young was named the Big Ten's Nagurski-Woodson Defensive Player of the Year, Smith-Brown Defensive Lineman of the Year and first-team All-Big Ten last season.
- Young holds the Ohio State single-season sack record with 16.5 in 2019.



2020 By The Numbers

Young registered three games with a sack and a fumble recovery this season, the most games doing so in a season for a Washington player in franchise history.

Young recorded four forced fumbles in his rookie season, the most by a Washington rookie since Ryan Kerrigan also tallied four in 2011.

Young's 7.5 sacks were the most by a rookie in 2020 and tied for the third-most by a rookie in franchise history.

Young became the fourth player and first rookie in NFL history to record at least two games with at least one fumble recovery, forced fumble, a sack and a pass defensed since the stats were first recorded in 1999, joining Khalil Mack [6], Jason Taylor [4] and Julius Peppers [2].

Young became the first rookie in NFL history and third player in history overall to record a fumble return touchdown, forced fumble, fumble recovery, sack and two-plus passes defensed in a single game Week 14 against the 49ers.

ANTONIO GIBSON Running Back

Draft Notes

- Gibson was the 486th selection made by Washington in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 37th third-round selection in that time frame. He is the 67th third-round selection by the Redskins all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.
- Gibson becomes the first offensive player to be selected by Washington in the 2020 NFL Draft.
- Gibson was the fifth player drafted by Washington from the University of Memphis, joining RB Richard Williams (1983), DE Carl Taylor (1975), RB Danny Pierce (1970) and DT Will Renfroe
- Dating back to 2011, Washington has selected a running back in 10 consecutive drafts, passing the team's previous high of drafting a running back in nine consecutive drafts from 1983-91.
- Gibson is the fourth player in franchise history selected with the No. 66 pick, joining T Morgan Moses (2014), DT Tracy Rocker (1989) and RB Mike Oliphant (1988).
- Gibson became the third running back produced by Memphis selected by Washington in franchise history joining Richard Williams (1983) and Danny Pierce (1970).
- The selection of Gibson marked the second-highest draft pick from Memphis, trailing only RB Richard Williams (No. 56 in 1983).
- Gibson was Memphis' sixth winner of The American Athletic Conference's Special Teams Player of the Year honor in the conference's first seven seasons, joining punter Tom Hornsey (2013), kicker Jake Elliott (2014-15) and return specialist Tony Pollard (2016-17).
- Gibson finished No. 5 in school history for all purpose yards in a single-season with 1,749
- Gibson did not record a fumble in his college career and he averaged 19.3 yards per reception.



2020 By The Numbers

Gibson became only the seventh player in franchise history to surpass 1,000 scrimmage yards in their rookie season, and first since Alfred Morris in 2012.

Gibson rushed for 11 touchdowns, the second-most in a rookie season in franchise history behind Alfred Morris's 13 in 2012. Gibson and Morris are the only two to notch 11 rushing touchdowns and 1,000 scrimmage yards in a rookie season in Washington.

Gibson became only the fourth rookie in franchise history to loa multiple games with two-plus rushing touchdowns, joining Alfred Morris, Robert Griffin III and Skip Hicks.

Gibson rushed for three touchdowns on Thanksgiving against Dallas, becoming the first rookie since at least 1948 to have three rushing TDs in a Thanksgiving game, and fourth player overall.

- Charles was the 13th LSU product selected by Washington all-time, joining E Charlie Webb (1946), B Red Knight (1947), E Charlie Webb (1947), B Dan Sandifer (1948), T Ray Potter (1952), B Vince Gonzales (1956), E Billy Shoemake (1959), RB Bob Brunet (1968), TE Robert Royal (2002), S LaRon Landry (2007), LB Perry Riley (2010) and RB Derrius Guice (2018).
- Charles was the first Washington player ever selected with the No. 108 overall selection.
- Charles was the first offensive tackle selected by Washington since Geron Christian Sr. (2018).
- Charles was the first offensive tackle selected by the Washington in the fourth round in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and is the first offensive tackle selected in the fourth round all-time since Fran Machisky out of Ohio State in 1956
 - Charles was part of a unit that was named the 2019 Joe Moore Award Winner given to the nation's top offensive line.
- Charles appeared in 32 games with 28 starts in three seasons and was named to the All-SEC Freshman Team in 2017.

- Gandy-Golden is the first ever Liberty product drafted by Washington.
- Gandy-Golden joins WR Ryan Grant (2014) as the second player in Washington history drafted with the No. 142 overall selection.

- Hudson was a three-time All Big Ten Honoree.
- Hudson was a Jason Witten Collegiate Man of the Year Semifinalist.
- Hudson holds a Michigan single-game record and tied an NCAA record for total tackles for loss in a single game when he registered eight against Minnesota in 2017.
